

# How to Use and Match Your EBT Benefits at the Farmers Market

Individual vendors cannot process your EBT benefits, visit the market information booth to receive currency for your benefits.

# SNAP (Food) Benefits

Visit the market information booth to withdraw SNAP benefits to receive market currency

- Staff will swipe your card
- Enter your PIN
- Tell staff how much to remove from your benefits



Receive \$1 SNAP tokens to make purchases at vendor booths

- \$1 tokens are good for all food items except: alcohol, hot food, and non-edible plants
- \$1 tokens never expire

Match your benefits with Double Up Food Bucks (DUFB), up to \$20

- DUFB can buy fruits, vegetables, beans, mushrooms, and plant starts/seeds that grow food
- The amount of DUFB you receive will match your withdrawn benefits, up to \$20
  - DUFB come in \$2 increments, so only even amounts can be matched

■ Examples:



- Withdraw \$8 from your benefits to receive eight \$1 tokens and four DUFB (\$8) = \$16 in total
- Withdraw \$20 from your benefits to receive twenty \$1 tokens and ten DUFB (\$20) = \$40 in total
- Withdraw \$5 from your benefits to receive five \$1 tokens and two DUFB (\$4) = \$9 in total

- You can only match up to \$20 each market day
- DUFB expire at the end of each year

Use both currencies (\$1 tokens and DUFB) to purchase eligible products from vendors

- Change is not given for either currency, vendors can help you make purchases that use your full benefits

# EBT Cash Benefits

Visit the market information booth to receive market currency for EBT Cash benefits.

- Tell staff you have EBT Cash benefits
- Staff will swipe your card
- Enter your PIN
- Tell staff how much money to take from your benefits



Receive \$5 green tokens to use directly with our vendors.

- \$5 tokens are good for all items in the market
- \$5 tokens never expire

Match your benefits with Cash Produce Match (CPM), up to \$20

- Cash Produce Match can buy fruits, vegetables, beans, mushrooms, plant starts/seeds to grow food, and unsalted/unoiled nuts
- Your Cash Produce Match amount will match your withdrawn benefits, up to \$20
  - Cash Produce Match come in \$2 increments, only even amounts can be fully matched

■ Examples:

- Withdraw \$10 from your benefits to receive two \$5 tokens and five CPM (\$10) = \$20 in total
- Withdraw \$20 from your benefits to receive four \$5 tokens and ten CPM (\$20) = \$40 in total
- Withdraw \$5 from your benefits to receive one \$5 token and two CPM (\$4) = \$9 in total

- You can only match up to \$20 once per market
- \$2 Cash Produce Match expire at the end of the year

Use both currencies (\$5 tokens and Cash Produce Match) to purchase eligible products from vendors

- Change is not given for Cash Produce Match
- Change is given for \$5 tokens



## Tips for Using Your Benefits at the Farmers Market

- Take a walk around the market to figure out how much in benefits you would like to withdraw
- We can enter your card number if you don't have your card
  - Your PIN will be required
- You can only match up to \$20 per market, but you can match up to \$20 at multiple markets in the same day
  - For example, on Sundays you can match \$20 at Montavilla Farmers Market and also match \$20 at Woodstock Farmers Market
  - Visit [doubleuporegon.org](http://doubleuporegon.org) to find more markets that offer an EBT match
- \$1 and \$5 tokens can only be used at the market where they were withdrawn
- DUFBI/Cash Produce Match can be used at all Oregon farmers markets that offer DUFBI/Cash Produce Match
- You can save DUFBI/Cash Produce Match for bulk purchases like a whole flat of berries when they come in season
- Use your matching currency before they expire at the end of the year
- If you have unspent \$1 tokens, you can put your benefits back onto your card at the information booth. You will also need to return any DUFBI you received for the amount you put back on your card
